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Introduction and Executive Summary:

1. OpenMedia is a grassroots community of Canadian Internet users that work together to keep our Internet open, affordable, and surveillance-free. We are dedicated to expressing the needs and interests of ordinary Canadians in our online lives in government proceedings and decision-making. To this end, we advocate for policies that respect the freedom of expression, access to information and free decision-making of ordinary people in Canada. On the production side, we seek fair and inclusive treatment in policies for all Canadian Internet content creators, particularly smaller and independent players. We recognize the critical role of the open Internet in the future of Canadian programming, storytelling and distribution. We are pleased to submit our response to key questions in Broadcasting Notice of Consultation CRTC 2023-138.
2. It is OpenMedia's position that all players in the Canadian content creation system need to be treated fairly while preserving and celebrating the cultural fabric of Canada. By closely considering the contribution framework's criteria and thresholds, we can establish a system that meets Bill C-11's goals of fostering innovation, amplifying underrepresented voices, and effectively contributing to Canadian storytelling, without undue interference or regulatory control of the feeds or content of ordinary Canadians.
3. Since the Bill's original proposal as Bill C-10 in 2020, OpenMedia's community of more than 218,000 Canadians have firmly emphasized the importance of respecting user choice, freedom for user-generated content from regulation as broadcasting, treating all Canadian creators equally and supporting small, innovative platforms in the market.
4. Our community wishes to see this Bill implemented in a manner that reflects the evolving media landscape and that supports the growth and success of online content creators across Canada, not in a ham-fisted manner that creates barriers between Canadians and the global Internet, or attempts to drag us back into a

less connected world. Since 2021, OpenMedia community members have sent more than 100,000 messages to our representatives on Bill C-11, asking the government to respect the online expression and choices of people in Canada by setting appropriate limits on the scope of this legislation. We write this submission on their behalf.

Q1. The thresholds proposed in Broadcasting Notice of Consultation 2023-139 and Broadcasting Notice of Consultation 2023-140 are being consulted on as part of those proceedings, and any decisions in that regard will be considered by the Commission in the context of this proceeding. Are there other criteria upon which the Commission should base its threshold for the purposes of the new contribution framework? If so, what should the specific threshold be (e.g., what specific revenue or subscriber level should apply)? Indicate whether the criteria or threshold should be different for audio versus video services and online versus traditional undertakings.

5. OpenMedia's primary concern in setting thresholds for regulatory inclusion is to minimize potential impacts on Canadian internet user expression or marketplace choices of implementation of Bill C-11 while allowing the Bill to accomplish its primary purpose of supporting Canadian content creation. Setting a substantial revenue threshold before a platform must meet C-11 obligations would help reduce the risk of reduction in user choice or regulation of user-generated content. As we indicated in our comments on 2023-139, we recommend increasing the revenue threshold target to a more substantial figure such as \$50 million in Canadian revenue, based on the Annual Digital Media Survey and pegging that threshold to inflation.¹ A higher threshold would still easily capture large platforms that are the primary targets of the Bill but would make it much

less likely that small niche streaming platforms will leave Canada, or that small Canadian platforms will avoid starting up in Canada for fear of high regulatory burden compared to other jurisdictions.

6. This approach balances different interests the Canadian public holds and provides a reasonable basis for determining the financial responsibilities of online platforms. Platforms generating significant Canadian revenue will be required to contribute to the funding framework, while innovative and emerging platforms will not be burdened by unnecessary financial constraints.
7. A higher threshold will also support the policy direction's guidance to wholly exclude social media user content from regulation. In the text of Bill C-11, the CRTC is asked to consider "*the extent to which a program, uploaded to an online undertaking that provides a social media service, directly or indirectly generates revenues*" as it makes regulations.² By these criteria, the content uploaded by digital-first creators and a great deal of content from ordinary Canadians is well within the scope of Bill C-11, as almost all our content earns revenue for someone, and the largest digital creators may earn millions of dollars in revenue.
8. This breadth poses unacceptable risks to the future freedom of expression of Canadians and is not a reasonable scope for Bill's C-11 described intention. Popular expression spaces like TikTok or Youtube frequently see users mix brief clips of commercial content alongside their personal thoughts and expression. Our online expression on modern social media exists in relationship to this commercial content, yet is also wholly our own. We literally cannot participate in the conversations occurring around many issues, including those of considerable social importance, without using clips, tags, and beats that started life as commercial content from a traditional broadcasting space. Yet treating the resulting social expression as 'broadcasting' would grossly misunderstand the

resulting content and constitute an undue intrusion on the lives and expression of ordinary Canadians.

9. Additionally, to better ensure that platforms that are important to a small niche of Canadian users but are not widespread broadcasters in Canada are not captured, a minimum subscriber count of 400,000 users could be added to the revenue threshold, to more clearly exclude those platforms.³
10. For this reason, we ask the CRTC to resist any suggestion that C-11 be expanded to include platforms that are primarily user-content driven, and carefully assess criteria and standards set for how to regulate content on mixed platforms like Spotify or Youtube to ensure that content that is fundamentally individual expression is not being boxed into a broadcasting framework.

Suggestions for criteria when determining which online undertakings should contribute to the framework by members of the Canadian public.

11. Please see Appendix D for all individual comments submitted by OpenMedia community members for the Commission's consideration of criteria for online undertakings.
12. For the Commission's review, we have highlighted below three relevant exemplary comments from the OpenMedia community, which have been sourced from the full batch of community comments referenced above:
 - a. *“As long as they are producing some prescribed amount of CanCon there should be no regulation. Individual searches and feeds should not be manipulated as far as existing search results and preferences, but rather maybe something like a CanCon tag can be added so that users can make their own choice”.* - Neil B

b. *“Function and Purpose: The CRTC may consider whether a platform primarily functions as a communication service or an online content provider. Platforms that primarily provide communication services (such as telecommunications companies or internet service providers) may be subject to different regulatory treatment compared to platforms that primarily provide content. Market Impact: The CRTC may evaluate the market impact of a platform to determine if it has significant market power or if it contributes to the concentration of media ownership. Platforms that have a dominant position in the market or that exert significant influence over the media landscape may be more likely to be subject to regulation. Consumer Protection: The CRTC may consider the need to protect consumers from harmful or deceptive practices on platforms. This could include evaluating issues such as privacy, data protection, accessibility, and the availability of appropriate mechanisms for resolving disputes. It's important to note that the specific criteria and considerations under Bill C-11 will depend on the language and provisions outlined in the bill itself, as well as any additional guidance or directives provided by the government.”* - Sbuc K

c. *“Provide more funding for Canadian creators so the content will naturally be Canadian without forcing anything. We have amazing talent right here and the world is becoming more and more aware of that. We just need to make sure we're supporting creators here so creators can stay and work in Canada.”* - Brittney K

Q5. How should the Commission define “social media service”? What, if any, criteria should be used to assess whether an online undertaking is providing a social media service?

13. When assessing whether an online undertaking is providing a social media service, the Commission should examine whether the service serves to primarily allow communication between users and sharing their content between them. This would provide a clear definition to differentiate from other types of online platforms.
14. Communication and Content Sharing: Social media services are services that primarily serve to facilitate communication among users, allowing them to exchange messages, share their multimedia content, engage in conversations and discover new user-generated content.
15. User-Generated Content (UGC): Most social media platforms primarily host user-generated content, which refers to content created and uploaded by users themselves. This type of creation often makes substantial use of content and assets originally produced within a commercial broadcasting framework, including clips of music, video which is reacted to or critiqued, and many more forms of expressive engagement, but is at its core unique self-expression, not reproduction of that work. The legislative framework of Bill C-11 as passed by Parliament is sufficiently broad that it continues to allow for the capture and regulation of much UGC on most audio-visual online undertakings, which OpenMedia considers a key deficiency of the Bill that must be remedied in the CRTC's regulatory approach. The widespread presence of UGC on a platform in terms of the proportion of content and associated revenue should be a key indicator of being a social media service.
16. User Expression: Social media services play a crucial role in enabling users to express themselves, share their opinions, and participate in public discourse online. The Commission should consider the implications on user expression when determining which online undertakings should be regulated as social media services, and how to regulate content and revenue from any included undertakings.
17. The definition of "online undertaking" should also be carefully evaluated. Platforms that primarily host user-generated content, such as TikTok and

YouTube, should be excluded from the scope, or have the user-dominated portions of their content and operations excluded. These platforms differ significantly in nature from streaming services like Netflix, as they rely on user-generated content rather than the transmission or retransmission of programs. They are fundamentally different and serve different purposes for users. By excluding platforms that primarily host user-generated content, it focuses regulation on traditional entertainment programming. While the government's draft policy direction to the CRTC on Bill C-11 suggests offering some protections to avoid regulating user-generated content, it is not enough. Including social media services that primarily host user-generated content could indirectly continue to capture user content.⁴ Excluding these services altogether would help maintain a focused approach and avoid unnecessary complications.

18. By considering these points, the Commission can establish a clear definition of "social media service" and ensure that the criteria used for assessment take into account the fundamental aspects of user communication, content sharing, user-generated content hosting, and user expression.

Q6. Generally speaking, commercial radio stations with total revenues exceeding \$1,250,000 are required to make basic CCD contributions of \$1,000 plus 0.5% of revenues in excess of \$1,250,000. Large English-language vertically integrated television groups have CPE requirements of approximately 30% of gross revenues from the previous broadcast year, while large French-language vertically integrated television groups have CPE requirements of up to 45% of gross revenues from the previous broadcast year, along with a requirement to produce original French-language programs. Licensed BDUs are generally required to contribute 4.7% of their previous broadcast year's gross revenues relating to broadcasting activities to Canadian programming, less any allowable contribution to local expression. With this in mind, under the new contribution framework, should the overall contribution commitment of

online undertakings be comparable to the existing contribution levels of traditional broadcasting undertakings? If so, which traditional broadcasting undertakings? Please explain.

19. Very broadly, subscription-based services such as Spotify and Netflix most closely resemble traditional vertically integrated television groups, while services that primarily rely on advertising revenue are more similar to BDUs. However, there are many features of the digital economy and its unique models that make direct carry-over of existing obligations inappropriate, such that the position of online undertakings are not directly comparable to the existing contribution levels of traditional broadcasting undertakings under the new contribution framework. In the case of a platform like Spotify, for example, revenues to artists are directly allocated based on user choices, so a revenue quota allocation requirement would not be appropriate.
20. How much revenue to demand specific platforms allocate to Canadian purposes is not OpenMedia's primary interest or expertise. We instead ask the CRTC to ensure the results of the resulting system are as flexible, give a broad range of viable potential partnerships for Canadian creators, and have an overall contribution requirement at realistic level to prevent the services from leaving the Canadian market – as some services are already exploring.
21. Placing ourselves within the range of similar initiatives by our international peers is one way to ensure we are not driving companies out - and it is worth mentioning that not a single other country has adopted requirements anything close to a net 30% national revenue contribution requirement commitment from streaming companies.
22. The European Union's member directives for on-demand services are a useful comparison for Canada's proposed requirements. At the high end is France's *Services de Médias Audiovisuels à la Demande* part of the *Audiovisual Media Services Directive* Decree, which mandates on-demand services allocate between 20% and 25% of their French revenues to the production of

French-language audiovisual content.⁵ At a more modest level, Switzerland has settled on a 4% requirement for platforms' revenue investment into local productions, mirroring the requirement imposed on local distributors.^{6,7}

23. A Canadian contribution requirement somewhere in between these levels is likely appropriate. When determining the contribution commitment of online undertakings, it is crucial to strike a balance between supporting Canadian content and ensuring the viability of a broad range of online services in Canada. By setting contribution levels realistically, excluding small platforms and aligning them with international standards, Canada can achieve Bill C-11's objectives without hindering the growth and operation of online platforms.

24. A carefully crafted framework can encourage online undertakings to contribute meaningfully to the Canadian content creation landscape while continuing to deliver the experiences their Canadian audience enjoys. This could involve a combination of financial contributions to the CMF, platform investments in local production for their existing content streams, and more flexible training support for Canadian creators and talent. The more flexibility allowed to contribute in ways that make sense for the platform in question, the more justifiable a somewhat higher revenue allocation standard may be.

25. It is OpenMedia's principled position that no part of C-11's implementation should be taking revenue from the Internet and online services for predominantly offline purposes. This would not be fair to Canada's digital creators, who should not be taxed for offline activity, and would not contribute to Canadian storytelling goals of Bill C-11. Modern culture is primarily created and experienced online; taxing

that creativity for offline purposes would not reinvigorate Canadian culture, it would only marginalize it further. While it is not the subject of the proceeding, it is critical that the Canadian Media Fund and CanCon definitions be reformed to be highly flexible and available to support online creation and Canadian online creators.

26. It is also important to recognize the ways online platforms have brought significant benefits to consumers, such as increased accessibility, diverse content options, and new avenues for content creators to reach audiences. Balancing the regulatory requirements with the advantages offered by these platforms will foster a vibrant and sustainable media ecosystem.

Q21. To what extent is the proposed new contribution framework adaptable to the needs and capacities of smaller, independent players?

27. A key goal of the framework must be to create an environment that enables smaller players to easily enter, innovate, participate, and in some cases eventually contribute to Canadian content creation, while accommodating their specific needs.

28. The framework should recognize the dominance of big players can potentially overshadow smaller entities, hindering their ability to participate and thrive in Canada. Equal requirements for both is not equitable to both, and may 'lock in' larger players, discouraging startups and preventing a broad range of small foreign services from providing content in Canada. Heavy regulatory requirements disproportionately affect smaller platforms, and to truly achieve fairness, they should be exempted or subject to significantly lighter requirements.

29. When OpenMedia community members were asked about which online services should be regulated as broadcasters, only 7% of respondents believed that small streaming services should be regulated as broadcasters, while an overwhelming 79% of respondents believed that none of the online services should be regulated in this manner.⁸

30. Some smaller platforms have already warned the CRTC's regulations could lead to them leaving Canada altogether if they're inappropriately burdensome. Crunchyroll, a Japanese anime streaming service, specifically raised concerns about burdening small platforms with a low contribution threshold.⁹ Roku and PBS have also warned about possibly leaving the Canadian market if the regulations are too burdensome on small services.^{10,11}
31. To prevent these undesirable outcomes, the CRTC should provide certainty to these players that they will not be included, or unduly burdened if they are. A higher \$50 million threshold as discussed above would help rule out many of these platforms; but the CRTC should consider adopting separate, lesser contribution requirements for some or all of these platforms if they do eventually exceed the revenue threshold, given that many of them have thematic or cultural focuses for which the full suite of C-11 requirements do not make sense. For small Canadian startups, a sliding scale of increasing contributions, after they meet whatever revenue threshold the CRTC selects, might help assure them that they would not suddenly acquire much greater regulatory obligations than they are prepared to meet if their business takes off, which could discourage them from founding themselves in Canada in favour of more innovation-friendly alternate countries.

Q24. Should the Commission recognize other forms of contributions to the Canadian broadcasting system, such as rights payments, predominance/carriage commitments (for example, 9.1(1)(h) or 9.1(1)(i)19 services), promotion/discoverability, training/internships, or capital expenditures? If yes, how should such contributions be recognized, measured and monitored?

32. Yes. OpenMedia will defer to industry experts on how to value these commitments, but adopting a framework that includes flexible means of meeting obligations will encourage compliance and fulfillment of Bill C-11's intended

results, while minimizing potential negative impacts on user content, expression and choice. For example, investing in training opportunities and internships can foster talent development and nurture a skilled workforce.¹² By providing aspiring Canadian creators with the necessary training and mentorship, the industry can enhance its capacity to produce high-quality Canadian content across various mediums. Programs like the talent accelerator programs offered by Netflix, such as imagineNATIVE Indigenous Screenwriting Intensive and HotDoc Accelerate, can contribute to the growth and diversity of Canadian creatives in key positions.^{13,14}

33. For content promotion or ‘discoverability’, we ask the CRTC to adhere to the government’s policy direction by prioritizing methods to make it easier for Canadians to find and consume Canadian content when that is truly what we are looking for - not force it on us across the board. There are several user choice-respecting ways of doing this, including:

- Requiring platforms to produce curated or algorithmically generated lists and feeds highlighting Canadian content, including French language and Indigenous content, and allocate promotional space to those lists within their interfaces. While many platforms already provide some level of this, mandating it and having a fixed promotion requirement across the board would likely increase awareness and use by many Canadians.
- Requiring platforms to provide a means for Canadian users to ‘opt in’ to or otherwise tune their Canadian recommendation quotas in their algorithmically generated feeds and search results, setting it to the level of their preference at a given time. This could include distinct preference settings for the inclusion of French language and Indigenous content.

Adopting this approach would give users the agency to opt-in to the promotion and explore Canadian content out of their own interest.

34. Either of these methods are much preferable to a heavy-handed obligation for most or all algorithmically generated results to feature designated Canadian content. Such an obligation is likely to produce poor and counterproductive results, as many users will not find the resulting results satisfactory or reflective of their preferences and may resist the system, whether by circumventing it with a VPN or demanding their MPs dismantle the system. It may further punish Canadian creators by reflecting lower actual user interest when presented with their content than they would receive organically, diminishing their organic representation in results in Canada and around the world, resulting in a net loss to their discoverability and revenue.
35. Conversely, a user-centric, choice-enhancing approach method will allow individuals to decide whether they want to delve into specific Canadian playlists or content categories that match their interests, giving them greater control over their browsing experience, which many users will likely appreciate. A user-centric perspective can enhance ‘discoverability’ without infringing on the autonomy of content consumers or the organic growth and discoverability of Canadian content. It ensures individuals have the freedom to determine their own content consumption preferences while still giving them opportunities to discover and engage with Canadian content of all types when they choose to do so.
36. In a survey of the OpenMedia community conducted from June 2023-July 2023, community members were asked which method of promoting Canadian content they would be most comfortable with. Approximately 71% of respondents answered they would support “an option you could turn on or off to make more Canadian content visible in your recommendations or searches”; 42% indicated they would support increased “funding for more Canadian creators”.¹⁵ These figures highlight that while many Canadians acknowledge the importance of supporting the production of Canadian content, they also have a strong

preference for a user-centric approach to content promotion that respects their ability to choose to consume Canadian content freely when they wish to do so.

37. By embracing a framework that prioritizes actual user choice and preferences in meeting content promotion objectives, Canada can foster a thriving broadcasting landscape that supports the production of high-quality Canadian content, nurtures talent, and respects the preferences and autonomy of users.

Q38. What is the role of content curators and aggregators, and playlists, in assisting with promotion and discoverability

38. OpenMedia firmly believes that online platforms that purely aggregate links to content elsewhere should have no obligations under Bill C-11 and no role in the broadcasting system it creates. The right to freely link to legal content without incurring obligations or restrictions for doing so is a foundational principle of the modern Internet that should not be interfered with.
39. As discussed above, creating promotion and discoverability requirements for platforms that are included in the regulatory ambit of Bill C-11 may be appropriate, but should only occur in a manner that respects user choices and preferences.
40. Requiring platforms to produce curated playlists of designated CanCon, or allocate dedicated promotion space in platform interfaces to designated CanCon, would be relatively unobtrusive means of using playlists and feeds to make Canadian content easy to find. These curated lists could be featured prominently on platforms, providing a dedicated space for users to explore and engage with Canadian content. This approach could help highlight the diversity and quality of CanCon to Canadians while ensuring it is not unfairly prioritized over other content.
41. If the CRTC decides platforms must promote Canadian content in a dynamic way across automatically generated feeds, search results, and playlists – a more complex approach that will be much harder to monitor and get right – it is critical

that users be given the choice to opt in to that weight on their preferences or opt out, changing their preference at any time.

42. In addition, linguistic options can be mandated to cater to users who prefer content in specific languages. This could involve language-based filters or personalized recommendations based on user language preferences, ensuring that CanCon is discoverable to audiences who prefer content in their primary official language.
43. As discussed above, mandating increased discoverability for Canadian content also potentially raises concerns for Canadian creators whose audience is primarily outside Canada. If the content is recommended to a primarily Canadian audience first — which doesn't engage with it — it could limit the international reach, which constitutes the vast majority of most Canadian creator audiences. If the content is not popular to whom it is recommended domestically, the online undertaking's algorithm could be disincentivized to recommend it to users outside of Canada. It may appear to be unpopular, while in reality, it hasn't reached the right audience yet. This poses an issue for discoverability and could inadvertently disadvantage Canadian content beyond Canada's borders.
44. Our recommended, less intrusive alternatives to mandating algorithm alterations to platforms and to users would provide an effective and balanced approach to promote the discoverability of Canadian content while respecting user autonomy, ensuring linguistic preferences, and avoiding potential disadvantages for Canadian creators in international markets.

Q39. Should the Commission consider requirements, incentives, or both to best ensure that audio and video content created by equity-deserving communities is distributed, promoted and discoverable? Are there different considerations for traditional versus online undertakings?

45. Promoting content discovery from equity-deserving groups is a worthy policy goal held by many people in Canada. However, traditional and online undertakings may require different considerations to achieve the same fundamental objective of promoting diversity and representation. Traditional undertakings, such as

television networks or radio stations, often have established programming schedules and channels that can be regulated through requirements and incentives. On the other hand, online undertakings, including streaming platforms and social media, operate within a more dynamic, user choice and algorithm-driven environment without set programming schedules or traditional limitations.

46. For online undertakings, it is essential that any requirements or incentives put in place do not negatively interfere with the user experience or user choice. As with our discussion of general discoverability requirements above, any platform obligations to make content from equity-deserving communities more accessible should be focused on curated playlists, dedicated promotion space, or allowing interested users to opt into more topical content, not forcing content across the board into user feeds. For example, dedicated categories on streaming services' main pages for equity-deserving communities strike the proper balance between making the content more visible while not interfering with the functionality of the online undertaking's algorithm. Existing promotions along these lines include content featured for Black History Month in February, Pride Month in June, or Netflix's "Made in Canada" tab that appears to users when they first sign in. The CRTC could regularize or enhance these obligations if it judged there was an opportunity to improve their accessibility and visibility to Canadians.
47. Where a CanCon content production or revenue allocation is set by the CRTC for a given platform outside of CMF obligations, portions of that support could be further sub-allocated towards the production of more content by designated equity-deserving communities on these platforms. This could include providing resources, training, or funding specifically tailored to online content creation, promoting partnerships between online platforms and content creators from marginalized communities. This would ensure necessary measures are in place to support the production of this type of content and would remove barriers to the access, export and sustainability of productions and content from equity-deserving communities.

Conclusion:

48. Most Canadians want to see our diverse cultural stories told and homegrown creators flourish. The controversies that dogged Parliament’s drafting and handling of Bill C-11 do not alter that fundamental truth. It follows that the CRTC’s implementation of Bill C-11 is a critical opportunity to finally put to bed lingering concerns over regulation of user content and interference with user choice, and shape a positive future for Canadian content creation, distribution, and promotion on the Internet, by Canadian Internet creators. By ensuring the revised system is fully accessible to digital content creators, particularly smaller and independent players, and promoting diversity, discoverability, and equitable distribution through user rights-respecting means, we can ensure a vibrant and inclusive media landscape in Canada.
49. In our submission we’ve outlined a path to accomplishing Bill C-11’s core goals while respecting the rights of ordinary people in Canada. A path forward exists to secure revenue for Canadian creators and ensure Canadians can find their work— all while respecting the choice and expression rights of ordinary Canadians, and without creating a system that partially excludes us from the global cultural commons of the modern Internet. Key recommendations we make include a flexible obligations framework with space for a range of compliance approaches appropriate to a given online platform; the clear exclusion of small platforms and social media platforms; designated Canadian content promotion obligations that are respectful of user choice; and firmly excluding all user-generated content from the CRTC’s regulatory intent once and for all. When upcoming consultations come upon revisions to the designation system for content to be recognized as “Canadian”, we will be happy to share additional thoughts on building a system that is open to all Canadian creators, fully representing the diversity of Canadian content and ensuring no one is left out.
50. It is paramount to respect user autonomy and rights when implementing Bill C-11. While the cultural objectives of the C-11 are important, they do not trump

Canadians' fundamental rights to untrammelled freedom of expression and access to information on the terms of their choice. If these objectives are ever in conflict, it is Bill C-11 that must give. Measures that could influence Canadians' online experience must focus on giving them more choice, the ability to opt-in to viewing more Canadian content online if and when they wish– not crudely shoehorn content into their feeds whether it fits or not.

51. By implementing these recommendations, the CRTC can establish a contribution framework that supports a vibrant and inclusive Canadian content ecosystem. This framework should foster innovation, empower underrepresented voices, and contribute to all Canadian content creators' continued growth and success.
52. OpenMedia, as a dedicated advocate for fair and inclusive media policies, stands ready to support this process and engage in further discussions and collaborations to ensure Canada's creative and cultural system thrives in the digital age. We look forward to attending an in-person discussion of Bill C-11 this November at the public hearing in Gatineau, where we will be proud to bring additional voices from our community on the implementation of Bill C-11 to be heard by the CRTC.

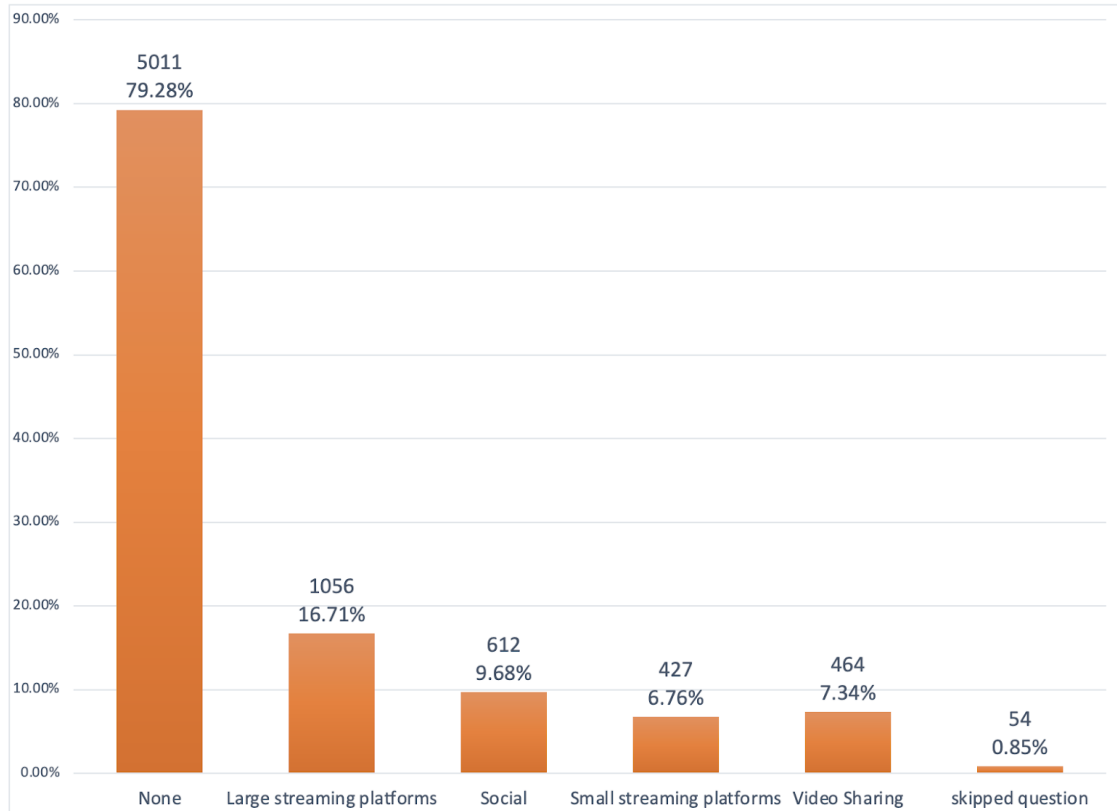

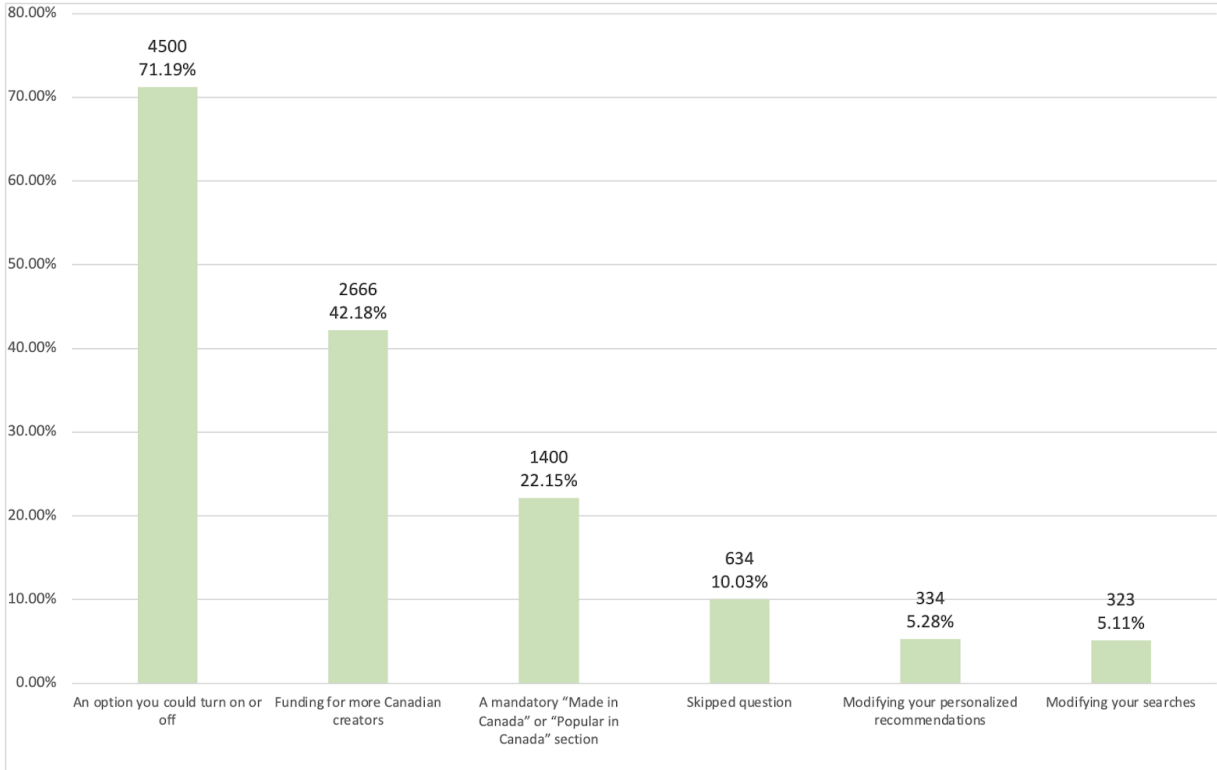
Question 1: Which online services do you think should be regulated as broadcasters under Bill C-11? (Check all that apply)

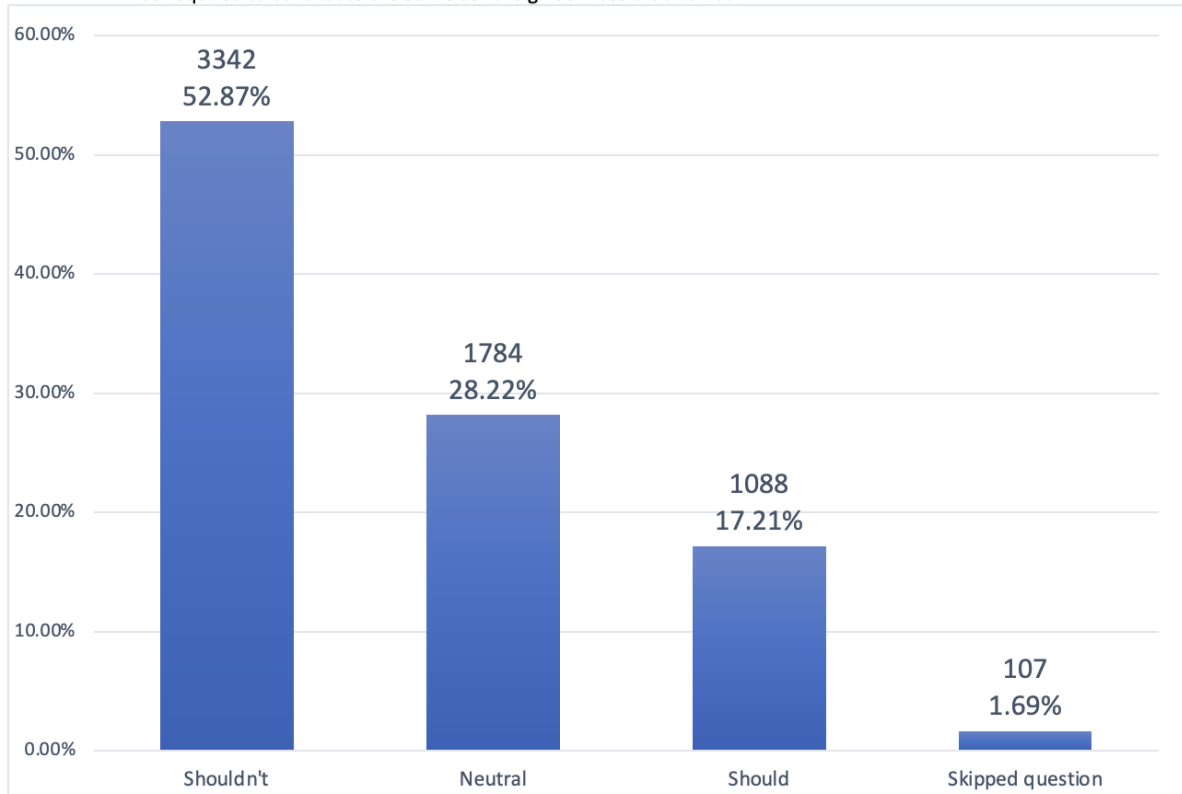
Question 3: Which if any of the following methods to promote Canadian content would you be comfortable with? (Check all that apply)

Netflix for example serves primarily content such as television shows and films which are already regulated by the CRTC on traditional cable networks. However, platforms like Crunchyroll specialize specifically in international media and would severely suffer from this same regulation along with other similar sites. Social media such as Tik-tok, Youtube, or Instagram, however, serve primarily user created content which does not fall under traditional broadcasting media. There is a hard line that should protect these services, which are already subject to surveillance and scrutiny by government bodies, from this sort of regulation. If they were to begin to alter my feeds or who sees my posts, I would see this as nothing more than a gross overstepping of bounds which has the very real potential to be misused and harmful. This attempt to regulate user generated content in this way speaks either to a misunderstanding of what these platforms are, or are an active attempt to control citizens' freedom of expression.

Also, C-11 may be opening the door to allow historically corrupt entities access and control over Canadians' news feeds; this may, in turn, lead to the inability to criticize the government, which is a steep, slippery slope into tyranny.
Laurece	P.	I am concerned that C-11 could change my experience on online platforms in a few ways. First, I am worried that the bill will lead to more censorship of content that is not considered to be Canadian. This could mean that I would have less access to content from around the world, and that I would be more likely to see content that is produced by Canadian companies, even if it is not of the same quality. Second, I am concerned that C-11 could lead to higher prices for online streaming services. Margaret	B.	<p>I am concerned that the Bill will restrict my knowledge of things happening in other parts of the world. I have been disappointed with the mainstream media for decades now because most of the news that they cover is from the US. I find that the way the news is reported is biased and not the equality base that I expect from Canada. I believe in news being news without opinion expressed by the reporting or the headline. This may not seem like such a big issue for some, but because of the place that social media holds in our current society, and the way it shapes a lot of our discourse and knowledge, I believe user generated content should be free from restriction, and individuals should have a choice in whether they are subject to these changes that will occur on social media.

These are people that I have formed genuine connections with that would not have been possible without the internet in its current form. The way these sites already chose which content appear on feeds based in part on geographical location. Access to a global network should allow Canadians to not just explore content curated from just one country. It should, as it has always, allow people to interact with the world and expand their understanding of other cultures. Finally, from a more utilitarian perspective, modifying search results would make the internet less useful to Canadians. The fact of the matter is that a lot of the web based tools or local applications that I use for work come from around the world. Internet Archive for example, is based in San Francisco California. Clip Studio Paint, the app I use for work, is developed in Japan. Should search results be modified, these sorts of tools would be more difficult to find if at all, especially for users unfamiliar to these tools that would benefit from them.

By forcing YouTube to show our videos to users based on their geography rather than their interests, bill C-11 will lock us into a negative-feedback loop. The increased rate of uninterested Canadian users being paired with inspecific Canadian-made videos will result in our businesses struggling to succeed on an international scale. To put this into context; A vegan in Ontario will not watch a barbeque tutorial simply because the chef is Canadian. An 80 year old in BC will not watch a video game montage simply because the commentator is Canadian. A 13 year old in Newfoundland will not watch an analysis of the economy simply because the panel of experts are Canadian. In these hypotheticals, the quota may have been met but views have decreased, revenue has decreased and the videos have been put at an algorithmic disadvantage leading to less reach in international markets.</p>

Freedom of speech and the free circulation of divergent viewpoints form the bedrock of any robust democracy. On the face of it, Bill C-11, with its potential to grant the government extensive control over news and commentary on the Internet, is intimidating. While I understand the need to regulate online content, this bill seems to do far more than ensuring ethical, responsible sharing of information,Äit could potentially curb voices and lay grounds for undue political interference. By extending the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission's (CRTC) remit into the vast terrain of the Internet, this bill could, in effect, give the government extensive power to regulate what Canadians see or don't see online. This is a precarious proposition, risking the turning of a blind eye to the diverse, often conflicting voices that foster critical thinking and informed decision-making. I am also gravely concerned about the implications this bill might have on independent news entities. With the shift of advertising dollars towards digital platforms, online media outlets - which play vital roles in holding power to account, have already been grappling to survive. The new regulative supremacy, embedded in Bill C-11, could potentially suppress these voices under the burden of administrative and financial challenges, thus inadvertently favoring propaganda.</p>
