- Metadata storage is not available on all platforms. Some applications can't store this kind of info; others are ethically opposed.
- This means that you could lose access to some applications if this bill is passed.
- Some example applications include: ProtonMail, Signal, and DuckDuckGo.
- OpenSource applications might also become unavailable.

The Bill Isn't Honest!

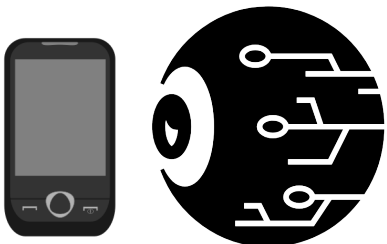
- The bill authorizes the Governor in Council to change the interpretation of terms in the law.
- This means the bill can be changed to cover what the government wants access to, or for how long the data can be held.
- The bill also makes it **easier for foreign governments** to access your data.

- What Should We Know About Bill C-22?
- It requires that places like Facebook, Instagram & Google store your metadata and provide gov't access.
- Metadata includes information like who you message, how often you message, your location, (what protests you attend)..
- This is what security experts call a **honeypot**. It's a database of privileged information that bad actors can steal.

- In matters of security, it's not a question of "*if*" a database is hacked - it is **when!**
- For example, in 2020, the CRA database was hacked and over **14,500** Canadians had their identities stolen.
